Breaking down barriers to opportunity November 2024

5 major government safeguarding proposals

1. Strengthening the role of schools Schools will become statutory safeguarding partners, sitting alongside local authorities, the police and health services.

2. Single identification system

The government plans to introduce a Single Unique Identifier (SUI) for every child. An identifier has the potential to increase confidence that practitioners from different agencies are talking about the same child and information sharing.

3. Improving data confidence Another key reform tackles barriers around information sharing between agencies.

4. Virtual School Heads

Virtual School Heads (VSHs) will now have their remit expanded to include children on child protection and child-in-need plans, as well as those in kinship care.

5. Home education

Children under child protection plans whose parents wish to home educate will need local authority consent to withdraw their children from school to be home educated.

Al exploitation refers to the misuse of artificial intelligence technologies to create harmful or deceptive content. This can include generating deepfake videos, spreading misinformation, or using Al tools to manipulate or bully others online. Children are particularly vulnerable to these risks.

Predators are now using AI-generated images to target children, making it harder for schools and parents to detect threats.

Become more aware and help protect children by:

- Having open conversations
- Educating them about AI
- Discussing AI misuse
- Verify Information: Teach your child to double-check information from AI chatbots
- Informing them where to go for support

Knife Crime

Knife crime in the UK has been increasing in recent years, with the number of offences rising year on year. The leading causes of knife crime include street violence, gang attacks, family issues, and robbery.

In the year ending June 2024, there were 50,973 knife-enabled crimes recorded in England and Wales. This is an 80% increase over the past decade.

London has the highest rate of serious knife crimes.

The West Midlands Police recorded the highest rate of knife crime offences per 100,000 population in 2023/24.
